## 3. Competences of the involved actors

## Handler:

Each handler is expected to have participated in a recognised training programme that includes the following subjects:

- o zoonoses (Lefebvre et al., 2008);
- o visual inspection for ectoparasites (Lefebvre et al., 2008);
- recognising farm animal body language, in particular in the case of discomfort, fear or stress (both acute and chronic) and responding correctly (Mariti, 2012; Fureix, Menguy, & Hausberger, 2010, Delta Society Evaluation Procedure);
- o farm animal needs and how to provide a stress-free environment for farm animals;
- o patient privacy (Lefebvre et al., 2008);
- o learning principles, in particular the use of positive reinforcement as a training method to facilitate a positive relationship with the farm animal.

The handler must communicate with the animal in a clear manner.

The handler should always have access to support from an animal behaviour specialist (Mariti, 2012) and a veterinarian.

## • Therapist:

The therapist should also have a basic knowledge of farm animal behaviour, welfare and training (Van Fleet, 2006, 2014b).

## Caregivers:

Ideally the caregivers should also have a basic knowledge of farm animal behaviour, welfare and training (Van Fleet, 2006, 2014b).
